J S Bach and the Jews

Talk with Q&A

Room 1

Bach's great choral works have moved listeners for three hundred years, and continue to do so today. Yet the Jews come out of the Passion stories of St Matthew and St John with a pretty bad press.

This session is an attempt to put the antisemitism of the texts in its historical and musical context, and to see whether, as Jews, we can somehow reconcile it with the enjoyment of some of the greatest music ever composed. As someone once said to me: "How can you even sing this stuff, you know, being Jewish?!" Come and find out.....

John Dunston may be the only person to have appeared on both Top of the Pops and as one of the Elders of the Children of Israel with the Hamburg State Opera, but in the end he chose a career in education. He was Head of two Quaker schools, from one of which he led the live broadcast of Sunday Worship on Radio 4. John is a former Vice-President of the Oxford Jewish Congregation, where he conducts OxfordShir, the choir he founded 24 years ago. He is a now remote supporter of Reading FC.

The Septuagint: The Hebrew Bible in Greek Dress

Translating the Torah into Greek, at the beginning of the Hellenistic period (± 275 BCE), was a momentous undertaking. The lecture will present the historical circumstances of the translation and the way it affected the message of the Hebrew scriptures.

Prof. Jan Joosten is a Biblical scholar. Since 2014, he has been Regius Professor of Hebrew at the University of Oxford. He was previously Professor of the Old Testament at the University of Strasbourg. He is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature.

Andrew Levine is an Entrepreneur and accomplished Public Speaker on topics ranging from Business Strategy to Jewish Ethics and their applicability to today's challenges. In this session, Andrew brings to life the Social-Political tensions of the Cold War and the human stories of the DAKARs sailors.

Thank God for not making me a slave

Slavery looms large in Jewish text, history and memory. But slavery is not something of the past. It is happening here and now. In this session we will examine what modern day slavery looks like in 2018 and the role that our community should play in tackling and ending modern day slavery.

Hannah Swirsky is Campaigns Officer at René Cassin, a charity working to promote and protect universal human rights, drawing on Jewish experience and values. We achieve this by campaigning for change in defined human rights areas – through a combination of advocacy, policy analysis, public campaigning and education and building the capacity of activists to promote and protect human rights.

Revelation of a hidden God: Connections between Shavuot and Purim

We all know the story of receiving the Torah on Mount Sinai, right? Yet the Sages teach that it was actually on Purim that we really received the Torah. Discover how book of Esther teaches us that the most powerful revelations of God can happen when God is so hidden he does not even get mentioned once.

Community Director at the Jewish Community of Berkshire in Reading, Shira organises cheder, community events, and Judaism talks at schools. She is passionate about practical spirituality and Jewish education that enables children, women, and men to expand their intellectual and spiritual horizons.

Session 2: 11:15 – 12:15

Greatest War Poet?

Talk Janet Lawson & Louise Robinson Room 1

In 2017 the Royal Mail commemorated the First World War with a range of stamps and included one that had an extract from 'Dead Man's Dump' one of Isaac Rosenberg's now celebrated poems. In this session we will discuss how the works of an immigrant Jew whose first language was Yiddish became placed on a par with those of Sassoon, Owen and Graves.

Janet Lawson is the great niece of Isaac Rosenberg - her grandmother was Isaac's sister. Although he died a generation before Janet was born, Isaac was always a presence in the house as his self-portraits would brood and stare out from the family's walls. Louise joins Janet analysing and reading the poems in a tribute to one of the lives wasted by what was meant to be the war to end all others.

Josephus on trial

The writings of Josephus are the primary source of our knowledge of Jewish history in the late Second Temple period, but for the last two centuries many Jews have treated his evidence as tainted because of his political career during and after the Jewish war against Rome which ended in the destruction of the Temple in 70 CE. The lecture will examine the origins of Jewish hostility to Josephus and the ambivalence of Jewish attitudes to his worth as a historian over the past two centuries

Martin Goodman is Professor of Jewish Studies in the University of Oxford and President of the Oxford Centre for Hebrew and Jewish Studies. His most recent book is *A History of Judaism*, published by Allen Lane/Penguin in 2017.

Noah's Ark : The Real Story

We all read the same Torah. Or do we? Orthodox, Masorti and Reform congregations now have their own, separate commentaries. I shall use those commentaries to demonstrate how the Torah text has now been utilised to support contrary agendas.

Norman Solomon has been in turn a United Synagogue Rabbi, an Interfaith Consultant, and a University Lecturer, latterly at Oxford. His books include *A Very Short Introduction to Judaism*, *A Historical Dictionary of the Jewish Religion*, *the Penguin Classics Talmud Selection*, and most recently *Torah from Heaven: The Reconstruction of Faith*.

Can we Believe the Media?

We are often misled by the media. Why and how does this happen, and how can we defend ourselves against the misinformation? With numerous visual examples.

Nomi and Sami work for Middle East Education (MEEDU), giving talks together in schools on *The Arab-Israeli conflict Both Sides of the Story* and *What is happening in the Middle East?*

Mindfulness for better living

In this talk, we'll walk through different theories and scientific findings, experience at least 3 different mindfulness practises which lead to peace of mind and inner clarity and will get practical tips and tools on how to bring more mindfulness to our daily life and boost our well-being.

Hagit Amsterdam is a mindfulness specialist and teacher who's spent years travelling, practising and consulting around the world. Originally from a Kibbutz in Israel, she holds a degree in Psychology and Political Science and a Masters in Conflict Resolution from the Hebrew University.

Jews and the Suffrage movement

As we celebrate 100 years since women first had the vote in England, let's look at the role the Jewish community played in the debate. Find out what happened when suffragettes interrupted a synagogue service on Yom Kippur, when one of the Anglo Jewish aristocracy gave Winston Churchill a whipping – and what the Rabbis at the time thought of it all.

Sybil Sheridan was formerly Rabbi at the Reading Liberal Jewish Community. She is now Rabbi at the West London Synagogue and Newcastle Reform Synagogue. She is chair of the charity MEKETA, set up to support Ethiopia's remaining Jewish community in Gondar.

Session 3: 12:30 – 13:30

A promised land: those who dared to dream **Performance** **David Finlay** **Room 1**

As we celebrate the 70th anniversary of the creation of the State of Israel David Finlay brings to life the drama of the years leading up to this epic event in his specially written performance piece. Drawing on the writings and speeches of those who were at the centre of these events including Herzl, Weizmann, Ben Gurion, Rabin and many others the performance brings to life the hopes and plans of those who dared to dream a Jewish homeland could be a reality.

David is a writer and performer of story songs and performance pieces on aspects of Jewish history. He is a former leader of the Jewish Youth Voluntary Service and is currently a volunteer for Tzedek, the Jewish charity which supports overseas projects. He is also Chair of the National Youth Agency.

Text, Tradition and Creativity - How to Write Your Own Commentary **Talk/discussion** **Francis Nataf** **Room 2**

We will be looking at the forgotten and major role personal creativity has played in traditional Torah study. After examining various sources celebrating creativity in the Jewish tradition, participants will engage in a short workshop designed to develop their own creative juices to interpret Jewish texts.

Martin Luther and the Jews **Talk** **Henry Cohn** **Room 3**

In 1517 Luther began his breach with the Papacy. Was he a precursor of the Nazis or just a man of his times in his attitudes towards Jews and Judaism? Putting Luther in the context of medieval antisemitism and the political and economic turmoil of his day, this talk will provide not a whitewash for a controversial figure but some shades of grey.

Dr Henry Cohn, historian and lecturer, has taught at Glasgow, Leicester and (mostly) Warwick universities. He is a member of Birmingham Progressive Synagogue and Alyth Reform Synagogue, having made aliya to north London a few years ago.

An Introduction to Jewish Genealogy **Talk with Q&A** **Leigh Dworkin** **Room 5**

If you have investigated your family tree, or always intended to do so but never got around to it, come and hear the Jewish Genealogy session and learn what you can find out about the sweep of Jewish history and geography, new languages and just why genealogy can be so addictive as you research your ancestors.

Know them to truly know yourself. Who do you think you are?!

Leigh Dworkin has been Chairman of the JGSGB since May 2016.

He is a passionate amateur genealogist and has been working on his own family tree for about 35 years. Genealogically speaking, he considers himself to be $\frac{5}{8}$ th Polish, $\frac{1}{4}$ Lithuanian and $\frac{1}{8}$ th Belarusian, judging by his great-grandparents' nationalities, which is far more interesting and exotic than being just an Essex lad.

MEEDU is educating students in British schools and Universities that both sides need to work for peace to ensure a long-term solution to the Arab-Israeli conflict.

In an attempt to keep the momentum for a drive for peace, Israel is endeavouring to maintain a humanitarian approach with its own people and with its neighbours.

Jonathan Taylor was born and educated in the UK, spent an extended period living in Israel, including serving in the Israel Defence Forces.

Luke Akehurst uses his unique insider knowledge as a former Labour National Executive member and expert on the forces behind anti-Zionism to explain how and why the Labour Party has got into such a dire predicament regarding Israel, Jews and antisemitism.

Luke has been Director of *We Believe in Israel* since 2011. *We Believe in Israel* is a BICOM initiative and is a broad coalition of over 16,000 supporters of Israel.

Our place in the ecosystem **Talk/discussion** **Zvi Solomons** **Room 2**

Vegetarianism and veganism have become more popular in recent years. What do traditional Jewish texts have to say about the way we relate to animals, and our place in the ecosystem. This session will examine meat, farming, hunting and the sacrificial system.

Zvi is the founding Rabbi of the Jewish Community of Berkshire, the only Orthodox community in the Thames Valley with its own rabbi. He and Shira run a lively Cheder (Sunday school) and their community has grown fast since it was founded in 2015. For more details contact Rabbi@JCob.org

'No Asylum for Infiltrators': Israel's dysfunctional asylum system **Talk** **Ruvi Ziegler** **Room 3**

The session takes stock of the legal predicament of Eritreans and Sudanese asylum-seekers in Israel through the lens of an academic advising NGOs and engaged in public advocacy. It explores the paradox of a country that played a role in drafting the refugee convention but never enacted asylum legislation, reflecting on how Israel treats (uninvited) non-Jewish arrivals.

Dr Reuven (Ruvi) Ziegler is an Associate Professor in International Refugee Law at the University of Reading, School of Law, where he is Director of the Global LLM programmes in Human Rights, International Law, and Advanced Legal Studies. Ruvi is an Academic Fellow of the Honourable Society of the Inner Temple; Convenor of the 'Civil Liberties and Human Rights' Section of the Society of Legal Scholars; Editor-in-Chief of the Refugee Law Initiative (Institute for Advance Legal Study, University of London) Working Paper Series; and a Researcher at the Israel Democracy Institute, analysing the treatment of asylum seekers in Israel as part of the Democratic Principles project.

Letters, secrets, and survival: A family story through and beyond the London blitz **Talk with Q&A** **Sherron Mayes** **Room 5**

After discovering her mother's memoirs after her death, and becoming aware of her own Jewish ancestry, Sherron tells how this inspired her new novel, *Letters to the Pianist*. Part biographical, part fiction, the author explores her mother's survival after she was orphaned in the blitz, and why she chose to make her the unlikely heroine of her WWII story.

We will use examples from the challenges and achievements we have faced in providing support for the Jewish community in Gondar in Northern Ethiopia in the areas of education and economic wellbeing.

Rabbi, writer and broadcaster, Jonathan Romain is minister of Maidenhead Synagogue. He is chaplain to the Jewish Police Association, chair of the Accord Coalition (campaigning for inclusive education) and a Patron of Dignity in Dying. His latest book is *Confessions of a Rabbi*.

Rebecca Abrams is an award-winning author and journalist. Her titles include *The Jewish Journey: 4000 years in 22 objects*, *Touching Distance*, *The Playful Self*, *Woman In a Man's World* and *When Parents Die*. She is Writer-in-Residence at Brasenose College, University of Oxford and a literary critic for the Financial Times.

The Book of Esther is one of only two biblical works that makes no mention of God (The Song of Songs is the other). Why is that? Why would the editors of the Bible include a story about the survival of the Jewish people in the face of almost certain destruction, and not publicly attribute it to divine providence? In this new and revelatory analysis, the designer and historian Stephen Games looks closely at the curiosities of the book as a piece of literature and of political history, and identifies two different authors with two agendas and not a lot of common ground.

Stephen Games is a designer with a doctorate from Cambridge in architectural historian. He is an award-winning architecture critic for the Guardian, arts reporter for the Independent, and a broadcaster for BBC Radio 3. Last summer he ran the first multi-disciplinary conference at the RIBA on the consequences of the Grenfell Tower fire.
